## Another 488 acres protected - forever

The Journey of 100 Years Begins Today



2006 was a watershed year for the Land Trust, a year that would not have been possible without your help. Nearly 500 additional acres of land are protected - forever.

The mission of the Land Trust is, and always has been, to protect farmland and natural areas in and around Washtenaw County. But, we went beyond that and asked the hard question: In 100 years, how will our grandchildren or greatgrandchildren view the work of our generation? Will they see our commitment, yours and mine, to this special place?

To address this question, in 2006 the Land Trust completed an ambitious strategic visioning process, which will be the foundation for our future. Many of you gave comments on this vision, and more of you will have a chance to do so as it evolves. This bright picture we glimpse ahead is the basis for what we - you, nearly 1000 other families in the area, and the Land Trust Board, volunteers and staff - will accomplish in the future.

We are committing ourselves to an ambitious new vision: an arc of protected lands reaching from the Waterloo/Pinckney Recreation Areas southward to the Sharonville Game Area and extending along the Huron, Raisin and Saline Rivers, with communities of working farms nestled within that extended arc.
With this arc comes the assurance that nature will be forever accessible to us - here, where we live.
The over 2500 acres already protected by the Land Trust is a stake in the ground for this vision. But, there is much
more work to be done. The challenge of creating this arc will require the Land Trust to be the best possible stewards of the financial and land resources entrusted to us.
2007 is a critical year in that effort. This year, we will:

- Continue to complete specific land protection projects at a rate we predict will be at least as great as 2006.
- Form new partnerships with like-minded groups and individuals to expand the ability of our community to identify and protect important land.
- Prioritize the most critical properties in our arc, and begin work with those landowners who are interested.
- Work toward becoming one of the first land trusts in the country accredited by the national Land Trust Alliance - a stamp of approval that we can stand behind our promise that the land will be protected forever.
- Continue to raise the profile and the success of land protection strategies across our community.
- Diversify and expand our support base, knowing that the land is forever, but the opportunity is now.
In the course of our planning, we realized that over $50 \%$ of the land in our area is neither developed nor protected. These lands - over 250,000 acres - are where our future will play out. If we protect the most important of these lands perhaps $10 \%$, or 25,000 acres - we, our children, and our grandchildren will be able to enjoy the water, woods and farmland that make this community so special.
This vision is ambitious, and the next several years are critical to our ability to achieve it. Nevertheless, we believe that by working together, we can all achieve this goal. We are so fortunate to live in a community of extraordinary beauty - and extraordinary people. Together, we can protect the land here, where we live.

When I said I missed winter, I meant the snow...not the cold. Next time I'll be more specific.

The Land Trust Journal you have in your hands is very specific. This is the second year we've provided you with a formal Annual Report. There's good news to report.

In 2006, we made special efforts to educate landowners about the federal tax incentives, and, through the development of the Land and Lawyer Handbook, to help their advisors serve them more efficiently. (Watch this space: Congress has introduced bills to make this increased benefit permanent, and similar provisions are included in the President's budget.)

Also in 2006, we helped shepherd property tax relief for the future owners of Michigan conservation properties. Whether the land is sold to new owners, or passed on to future generations of the family, conservation properties are no longer subject to the property tax 'pop-up', experienced when land changes hands. We think this may help create a market for conservation properties, and will definitely make it easier for families to retain title to family lands.

Doing the right things locally has increased our visibility state wide and nationally as well. We were one of the land trusts featured in a Land Trust Alliance story on landowner education, and we are increasingly asked to be available to national reporters covering this emerging story. In Michigan, I've now finished my first year as a member of the Board of Directors of the Heart of the Lakes. This public policy advocacy group is raising the protection of Michigan's natural resource heritage to a priority in our legislative process.

Some of what we accomplished doesn't sound very exciting: for example, we're changing our fiscal year from a December 31 close to June 30. This will remove some of the uncertainty from our budgeting process, but won't effect what you see - except for the timing of the next annual report.

Thank you for all you do to ensure that this important work can continue.

## Notes From The Land

NEW! Property Tax Relief for Conservation Land

Good news for private land conservation in Michigan! A brandnew amendment to state tax law exempts conservation land from the property tax "pop-up" upon transfer of ownership.

Usually, when property changes hands in Michigan, the taxable value "pops-up" to the State Equalized Value. This can mean a dramatic increase in the property tax. With this amendment, conservation agreement properties are added to the list of exempted transactions. This means that even after such properties are bought, sold, or transferred, the property tax does not "pop-up" - the tax is now capped at the typical year-to-year increase of five percent or the rate of inflation, whichever is less.

This is in addition to the current incentives for conservation: potential federal income tax deductions, local property tax reductions and federal estate tax benefits. For more information, contact the Land Trust at 734-302-LAND (5263).

## Expanded Tax Deductions for Conservation Expire at Year-end

For a limited time, the federal deductions are expanded for property owners who donate conservation agreements.

- The allowable deduction is increased from $30 \%$ of your income in any year to $50 \%$
- Qualifying farmers and ranchers may deduct up to $100 \%$ of their income
- The carry-forward period for taking deductions is extended from 5 to 15 years.

A bill has been proposed to make these incentives permanent, but they are currently scheduled to expire at the end of 2007.

## Land and Lawyer Handbook Available

The Washtenaw Land Trust is pleased to announce a new resource designed to meet the needs of attorneys, estate planners, accountants, and others who provide advice regarding conservation options - The Land $\mathcal{E}$ Lawyer Handbook: A Practitioner's Guide to Conservation Easements. ## New Bill Slashes Taxes on Charitable Gifts

Did you know that a new provision allows tax-free distributions from Individual Retirement Accounts, or IRAs?

Thanks to recent legislation, you may be able to avoid paying income tax on IRA distributions for gifts made to a charity. To qualify for this new option, the owner of the IRA must be age $701 / 2$ or older, and the gift must be transferred directly to a qualified charity. This option covers gifts of up to $\$ 100,000$ per person, per year, in 2007.

As a qualified charity, the Land Trust can accept such gifts as unrestricted, designated, or endowment funds. To learn more, please contact the Land Trust or your financial advisor.

## Protect Natural Areas \& Farms, Here Where You Live

Partnering to protect public natural areas and wildlife habitat


The Washtenaw Land Trust, Ducks Unlimited, MDNR and FWS partnered to protect 138 acres of natural habitat adjacent to the Waterloo Recreation Area. At the closing were Russ Terry of Ducks Unlimited, Allan and Deanna Malan, and Jim Hudgins of FWS. The inset map shows the location of the newly-protected property.

The Land Trust is delighted to announce that 138 acres of wetlands, forest, and agricultural land have been protected for public use. Ducks Unlimited, the Washtenaw Land Trust, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR), and the U.S. Fish \& Wildlife Service (FWS) partnered to purchase this high-quality natural area directly adjacent to the Waterloo Recreation Area. After Ducks Unlimited acquired the Jackson County property from a private landowner with help of a North American Wetlands Conservation Act (NAWCA) matching grant, they donated it to the FWS as Michigan's fourth Waterfowl Production Area - and the first new one since the early 1980's.

Waterfowl Production Areas are properties that are jointly managed by the FWS and the MDNR to provide a diversity of wetland and native grassland habitat necessary for ducks and other waterfowl. They also provide critical habitat for a
variety of other wildlife species and are open to the public for recreational and educational opportunities.
Thanks to many generous donors, the Land Trust was able to contribute $\$ 10,000$ from the Waterloo Fund to provide part of the required match to protect this property. Thank you to all those who have made gifts to the fund. It's because of you that great projects like this are possible.
This project is a resounding success in the effort to reduce the rate of fragmentation of nat-
 ural areas in the Waterloo-Pinckney region, one of the Land Trust's top priorities. This region makes up the largest block of public recreation land in lower Michigan - let's keep working to enhance this asset to our community!

> Protecting family lands: The Sullivan family farm

Half of the Sullivan Farm in Webster Township has been conserved through the Washtenaw Land Trust. The descendants of Agnes Hoey Sullivan have conserved 50 acres of the family homestead on Mast Road and 30 acres of woodlot between Gregory and North Territorial Roads. The land has been in the family since the Homestead Act in 1835, and five generations of the family have farmed it since then, from 1835 to 2000. It contains one of the largest cherry trees in southern Michigan, rolling hills, and wildlife habitat. The land has been home to sandhill cranes, great blue herons, Canada geese, egrets, hawks, fox, raccoons, deer, rabbits, and songbirds. It will remain in farm use for the foreseeable future.

Challenge grants can quadruple your gift

The Land Trust has been awarded challenge grants to protect part of the Rogers property, a keystone farm in York Township near Saline. The parcel was strategically chosen for protection: it adds to a block of 500 already-protected acres south of Ann Arbor, and it is the first phase of the farmer's plan to protect his entire farm.


The Land Trust's Farmland Protection Challenge needs your help to add a 43-acre parcel to a block of 500 already-protected acres of land.

The math works like this: If the Land Trust raises $\$ 127,000$ by this August, that money will secure a federal matching grant of $\$ 215,000$, a grant of $\$ 25,000$ from the Carls Foundation, and the donation of $\$ 242,000$ in land value from the landowner.
We have only $\$ 65,000$ left to raise. Your gift to the Farmland Protection Challenge before August 2007 is crucial, to earn the full match and protect this land.

You know, every time I get off the highway and drive even just a couple miles out of town, I'm relieved to see wide open vistas and tree-lined rural roads. Living in the city, I sometimes forget how much of our community is still open and undeveloped - and how wonderful that can be on a Saturday afternoon!

The natural systems are there. But they're not necessarily protected yet. This project is an opportunity to do our share to conserve a piece of this - forever.
